By the nature of my role I have the unenviable task of writing something sensible about Taurus, so here goes:

Taurus, as many of you know, is a club that was formed (in the mid 80's) by a group of oarsmen and women who were Oxford Poly rowers suffering from a severe lack of equipment but with high ambition for the boat club. In addition they had formed a strong bond between them as a group. With their experience in mind they founded Taurus BC.

They wrote a constitution with the following aims:

- Taurus would be a social club to promote the links between past members of the poly/university;
- Taurus would support Oxford Poly, now Brookes Boat Club, financially where possible;
- Taurus BC would promote participation within its membership. To this end Taurus is registered as an active rowing club, allowing members to row under the Taurus colours if they want to.

Taurus has largely achieved the aims of the constitution and indeed has had many great successes over the years.

Support comes in many forms. Taurus has been as generous as the funds allowed. The first donation to the Poly Boat Club was a megaphone, and since then Taurus has donated blades and even boats to the university. The donations have, in the main, only been possible as the funds have grown from the subscriptions collected.

Brookes rowers are still making headlines

The last international newsletter article was in March 2005. The summer before, we had just celebrated Steve Williams becoming the fourth Brookes/Poly Olympic rowing champion. During the summer of 2005, Williams and another ex-Brookes rower, Alex Partridge, became world champions in the GB coxless four. Half the top men's crew from Brookes: not bad going. Time for a roll-call of those from Brookes and Taurus who have pulled on GB lycra during the last few years.

2005

That summer, a slew of Brookes rowers (and two coxes) took to the water in GB colours. It started with the World Cup regatta in Eton, where the new M4- (pictured, below) won gold, and ex-Brookes Danny Harte with Nick English beat their GB team-mates to the bronze in the men's lightweight pairs.



Meanwhile former Brookes Temple stroke Henry Bailhache-Webb had become the new men's eights stroke, with able support from Tom Parker and Jonno Devlin in the same crew. In July six student rowers and a cox made the under-23 squad, Hugo Lee coming home with a coxless fours bronze, and Richard Chambers a lightweight quads silver. The summer ended with Carla Ashford and Caroline O'Connor making it into the women's senior eight in time to join the six Brookes men in Japan for the world championships. The eight came an extremely creditable fifth, only a length off winners Australia. The men's four won, the eight came fourth, and Danny Harte in the lightweight pair won the B-final.

2006

The 2006 season began with Brookes boy Tom Parker getting himself into Harris Manchester College Oxford, which would eventually give him a winning Boat Race blue the next March. The GB men's four continued their domination, winning everything they raced, and there were five Brookes men in the under-23 team. The most notable of these was lightweight Richard Chambers, who paired his way to under-23 gold with Chris Bartley, and was subsequently selected for the senior team. And this was for a home worlds, so that tens of thousands of supporters, including dozens of Taurus members, were on hand to see Partridge and Williams win their second

gold in a row. With them in the team were Parker and Lee (M4+, 5th), Chambers (LM2-, 6th), Devlin (M8+, 5th), Ashford and O'Connor (W8+, 8th), Harte (LM4-, 5th). Meanwhile the university crews bagged a Henley Royal double, winning the Temple and Visitors' cups, of which lots more in a future newsletter.

2007

Time for some Brookes women's success, with new recruits Vicky Bryant (a Youth Olympics gold medallist) and Kirsty Myles winning bronze in the coxless four in sunny (not!) Strathclyde. Another bronze came from Ryan Davies in the coxed four, his first in four years of Under-23s, and Matt Tucker and Will Robinson finished sixth in the eight. At the senior level it went pear-shaped for Williams and Partridge in the coxless four as they lost their champions' crown, so it was left to the rest of the rapidly multiplying Brookes cast to pick up the medals. This year's was Richard Chambers (right, below), who was first across the line as his lightweight four took the first gold in 15 years. But there were bronzes for four Brookes/Taurus members in the eights: Al Heathcote stroking the eight with Tom Lucy further back, and Ashford and O'Connor (aka Boycey, pictured right) again in the women's crew.



2008

And so to the Olympic year, by which time Jonno Devlin had skipped the country to row for Ireland. Before the Olympics we had the under-23s (fours bronze again for Vicky Bryant, Kirsty Myles and Rachael Jefferies; fifth for the eight including Chris Abraham, Karl Hudspith and Scott Durant with Henry Bailhache coaching). And the non-Olympic world championships - a bit of a let-down with no medals in the whole team, and 12th overall for Harte and Bartley in the LM2-. Later in the summer Kirsty was selected for the European championships women's eight which ran Olympic runners-up Romania very close and bagged an excellent silver medal.

Finally Beijing beckoned. In the GB Olympic team alone Brookes/Taurus had eight representatives, and five of those came home with medals. The disappointments were the women's eight (Carla & Boycey) who came fifth after illness had forced last-minute crew changes before the final, and the lightweight men's four (Richie

Chambers), just not quick enough in the finish sprint, and also fifth. (Below, Boycey and Chambers show off their Olympic kit).



The men's eight final was an absolute thriller, Canada dashing out, but GB hard on their heels and several times looking as if they could perhaps bid for gold. In

the end the Canadians were just too quick, and with the USA blasting up on the far side GB did well to take away silver. Three full-on Brookes medallists: Al Heathcote, Tom Lucy and Alex Partridge, with an honourable mention for Matt Langridge, who was at Brookes for two months many years ago before he was persuaded to move to the Henley college.

The headlines in China came from the two gold medals, and as ever Stevie Williams (second from left, below) was spokesman and elder statesman of the men's four. They gave the most incredible display of nerve and confident power after their loss of the year before. Taken slightly off-guard by a monstrously fast Australian start, they kept their heads and waited for the right time to drag back the lead. Watching that final sprint, as their bows inched steadily past the Aussies, was one of the best experiences of the Olympics.

The last Olympiad has seen Brookes rowers and coxes win more world medals than ever before, and the club still has plenty of strong, committed oarsmen and oarswomen making their way steadily towards the national squad. The next four years could be even better.

What's the plot? Temple Cup 2009?

Henry Bailhache-Webb, now coaching Oxford Brookes rowers, reports on the university squad's winter season so far

At the moment we have just over 50 guys and girls who are in the process of being trained so that we can go to war with the rest of the rowing world. Their first very battle of the year came in the form of the Fours Head, where we were caught pants down with too many holes in our rusty armoury. We got speared. This was mainly due to poor troop placement on my part, (the toughest part of the Fours Head). But we left the river running with our blood, and nothing to show for our efforts.

We needed to have a solid line-up and to win something. So after two weeks of planning and training, the Brookes war machine travelled in full force to race Bristol University Head in late November. Outnumbering the locals and other travelling blade carriers we had the chance to stick our oars in where they weren't wanted. We learnt how to win and came away having done the job we set out to do leaving with a taste for victory, more confidence and with

many scalps to show for it.

Only a week later Wallingford was invaded by a bunch of cold and hungry uninvited travellers, some of whom were stronger and more skilled than we had previously encountered; this was going to test us. We produced the best lines of defence we could on our side of the river. There were two strong waves of attack but we held firm and sent the barbarians from Molesey and Henley home blooded, disappointed and empty-handed. The men were unbeaten in all six of the eights categories from Elite to Novice, showing strength in depth. The women produced the second fastest four of the day to win the S3 pot.

All in all it was an important test for the guys and girls that their time training is starting to pay off. Now can we keep this momentum going against some tougher competition when it's not our home water?

Vesta Vets' Head - Taurus rules

Great Taurus crews have rowed for the last five Veterans' Heads, with five wins for T1 on the run from 2003 to 2007. Two crews entered in 2008, with the top crew aiming for a sixth consecutive title. But with banter outweighing training it was probably lucky that the race was cancelled with just minutes to go until boating, due to filthy conditions up round Corney Reach (*see photograph*). A boastful paddle from Barn Elms to Putney and back confirmed that the rigging was a bit dodgy, and everyone repaired to the pub to celebrate.

Toughening up

Kirsty Myles explains what training under the Brookes regime did for her rowing

The four years I spent at Brookes provided me with a fantastic mentality and made me much stronger both mentally and physically. The club has really taught me how to train hard, from very intense gym sessions, to side by side paddling on the river. The club spirit made it enjoyable but very competitive. This has helped progress me from a junior athlete to an Under 23 World Championship bronze medallist (*second from right, pictured*).

Most importantly training at Brookes has transformed my racing and given me that extra edge and the aggression that has helped win medals. At the European Championships

in Athens in September 2008 this toughness really showed through as we were racing the Romanian eight that won silver at the Olympics. I was in the stroke seat and it took a lot of guts and determination to keep a level head and just keep pushing our way back to them. They only managed to take 2 seconds out of us, and the "never give up" attitude that I have got from Brookes really helped me give everything I had.

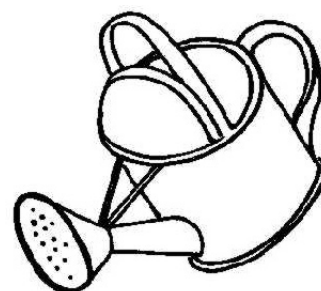
