Taurus storms back to HRR

Brookes athletes past and present making their mark at Henley, and 2009 was happily no exception.

The first mention must be for the winners of the Prince Albert Challenge. The event, for university coxed fours, is only four years old and had so far eluded Oxford Brookes. However, this summer, just three years after winning the Temple, the Brookes students picked up another university title, a credit to the work of athletes and coaches alike and a demonstration of the ongoing supremacy of Brookes' rowing.

The manner in which the five crew-members took the title was emphatic, winning every race by clear water and beating a strong Yale crew in the final by over four lengths. **Scott Durant**, **Matt Tarrant**, **Chris Abraham**, **Karl Hudspith** and cox **Hannah Clews** (*below*) enjoyed their triumph to the fullest and we congratulate them on their success.



Another undergraduate to win this summer was **Peter Chambers**, who stroked a composite lightweight quad to victory in the Men's Quads. Peter, who arrived at Brookes last September, has wasted no time in emulating older brother Richard Chambers' achievements, as he is already an established member of the British U23 team. But with this victory he now can pride himself of having one over his Olympian brother who has yet to win at Henley.

Caroline O'Connor has long been a servant of Brookes and has loyally retained her affiliation with the club even now that she is fully involved with the GB squad. After so many years of being within touching distance of that win but always coming up short, we are happy to report that 'Boycie' finally has her first Henley medal from coxing the GB women's eight to victory in the Remenham Challenge Cup. She did so over the challenge of four other Brookes stars, Rachael Jefferies, Leonora Kennedy, Vicky Bryant and Zoe de Toledo, in the U23 women's eight beaten by Caroline's crew in the semis.

Tommy Burton, now rowing for Leander, was part of the GB men's eight which, after thirteen years finally became Grand Challenge Cup champions as the British squad crew. Tommy is the first rower from Taurus/Brookes to win the Grand.

The Stewards' Challenge Cup, for international coxless fours, was also won by GB which meant that after a year in the eight, former Brookes oarsman **Alex Partridge** returned to the four and has added yet another Henley medal to his collection.

Nobody could forget Eton's PE win, giving **Alex Henshilwood** his third HRR trophy in six years. If coaches got medals he'd be rivalling Danny Marett by now. Special mentions also go out to **Alistair Cordey** and **Liz O'Neill**. Since winning the Temple in 2006, Al has worked relentlessly at Molesey and was part of

their eight which stole the show in the Thames Cup. After her time with Brookes Liz returned to cox her home club of Agecroft, which this year ended a long wait when they triumphed in the Britannia Cup.

So much more to include — Roger Ewing a Thames Cup finalist for Henley; Danny Harte stroking London and unlucky enough to be 3ft the wrong side of the semi-final against Leander (grr); Brookes & Tethys qualifying for the Remenham, two Brookes eights in the Temple. And a big cheer for Wallingford — aka Adam Moffat, Will Bryant and Ruben Reggiani with talented junior Erlan Hazine, who lost by a measly 1/3 length to Nottingham and Union in the semi-finals.

For all of us members of Taurus though, the main highlight must have been seeing that electric blue lycra racing down the course after years of absence (*above, right*). Peter Randolph, who stroked the Taurus eight at this year's Head of the River, teamed up with Oxford Brookes captain Alex Holden-Smith to produce a competitive pair in the Silver



Goblets. After a fantastic opener where the duo dispatched good American students, they had to concede against the combination of Murray and Bond, the New Zealanders who have since then become world pairs champions.

The 2009 Royal Regatta will also be remembered for the return of the famous Taurus barbeque which was surely the social event of the regatta attracting a strong crowd on the Saturday night. We would like to thank Robbie Kennedy, Tamsin Adams and all those involved, for their efforts in organising such a memorable bash (*see overleaf*).



13 years after Brookes won the Brit, a new generation of champions broke Yale's spirit in the 2009 final of the Prince Albert Challenge Cup. Cox Hannah Clewes looks back...

On the morning of the race I was nervous, I felt the pressure that is only felt before a Henley final. I remember Rich giving me a pep talk in the boat tent saying that this was the biggest race of our lives, I knew that we all had to be the best we had ever been.

To be honest the paddle up to the start was a blur, but I have a vivid memory of sitting on the stake boat staring down the course. Just don't mess up Hannah! This was it.

Attention, GO!

I knew we had a great start because at the end of the island I glanced round and saw that Yale already had a deficit of about half a length. The head wind was undoubtedly strong and I could feel it as we came out of the island but the boys were relentless and started to break any connection which still existed between the crews. The boys were awesome! The remainder of the race was testimony to all the blood, sweat and blisters that we have all put in during the year. As we came through the Stewards' Enclosure I remember thinking to myself, we are going to win Henley, WE ARE GOING TO WIN HENLEY! As we crossed the line I felt sheer relief and pride in what we had achieved.

That day was incredible and will stay with me and the boys forever. The whole crew would like to thank Rich, Henry and Mossy, I am glad that we could repay all of your time and effort with a Henley win. As always thanks and respect is there for everyone at Brookes and Taurus. This was not just a win for 5 people but it was a win for the club, past and present.

Beating the world...

Steve Williams on a pre-retirement year off, Richie Chambers recovering from injury, Al Heathcote becoming the coaching hero of Thames and Jonno Devlin now the official pin-up boy for Carla's Point2Fitness operation—anyone would have thought the glory days of Brookes and Taurus in the senior GB team were now over with so many absences.

But no, there was still Spratley-trained talent at the senior worlds, while the next generation, under the tutelage of **Henry Bailhache** and Nick Strange, was busy making the under-23s a roaring success this year.

WORLD CHAMPS 2009

First we visit Poznan, the less glamorous successor to the Beijing lake and the site of this year's senior world championships. Poland used to be something of a dull location for rowing, but Poznan has turned into a party town in recent years, making it a much more appetising prospect for spectators to visit.

2009 was **Tommy Burton's** year, as he made it into the senior team after what seems like decades of merely winning fistfuls of Henley medals. After a reasonable season a very new **M8+ men's eight** ended fifth at the worlds, probably about what was expected. But their real moment of glory came a week earlier, when they clinched a finals spot at the first attempt.

Picture the scene in the opening heat: Germany's revived eight (the eventual winners) way in front, with Australia thinking themselves safe in the second qualifying place behind them. Up charged the Brits, Tommy stroking the crew from the 2-seat (obviously), sprinting for their lives. Photofinish, but the GB arms have already gone up, and they're right, beating Australia by 0.05 seconds. Great result, though having to wait a week to race again may have taken the edge off for the final. The **W8+ women's eight** was helmed again by cox **Caroline O'Connor**, and they also finished fifth overall. An originally decent medal chance was hit by last-minute illness (training camp mumps) and injury which forced them to change line-up twice during the week.

But the biggest Brookes/Taurus story was in the **M4- men's four**, with an even more cunning Grobler plot than usual. In April, Jürgen decided his two returning Olympic champions, Pete Reed and Andy Triggs Hodge, would try their luck in the pair. With so many retirements and years off, that left just three other Olympic medallists (Langridge, Egington & Partridge) to form a new four with Alex Gregory.

The four quietly did well enough to know it was fast, and profited when Germany decided to put their fastest guys in the eight. That left just Australia as the only top-class four our boys hadn't already beaten when they got to Poznan, even though the attention was all on the pair. They got the mumps early in training camp, and came to the worlds fighting fit. In the final the Brits surged out and won the coxless fours again, Redgrave style, from the front. And that is how **Alex Partridge** (below, right) became world champion for the third time, another tick in the ex-Brookes box.





U23 WORLDS 2009

In the 18 years of the Under-23 worlds and Nations' Cup, Brookes rowers are rarely absent from the podium. In 2009 every single GB medal crew involved Brookes expertise, including the women's eight (*above*), unfamiliar territory to GB Rowing since it was added to the programme in 2006.

The W8+ squad got together in April: the plot was racing, the more the better. First Essen (third), then Henley Women's Regatta (second to winners Yale), then HRR (knocked out by Boycie's GB senior crew in the semis). And finally the real goal of the season, the U23 worlds in the Czech Republic.

By this time the crew was confirmed with **Zoe de Toledo** coxing, and bookended by current and former Brookes rowers **Vicky Bryant** (bow), **Leonora Kennedy** (7) and **Rachael Jefferies** (stroke). Unbeatable. The girls won their heat, avoided a hurricane which smashed up the GBR M4+ and the POL W8+, waited out the next two days with nothing to do, and then, on Sunday, created the perfect race.

Leading quickly, they got a couple of seats on Poland within a minute, half a length by 1km, and not far off clear water over 2nd as the Americans finally disposed of Poland and started to charge. Too much for the USA to make up, and anyway Britain had speed to spare. Vicky Bryant was the first rower in the race across the line. They became the new champions of the world — Britain's first W8+ world gold of any kind (junior, senior, Olympic),

ever. Wow. Historic. And it was amazing to watch. Congratulations everyone.

Meanwhile two other Brookes rowers and a coach were busy picking up excellent bronze medals. The M8+ men's eight (below) included **Chris Abraham** and was coached by **Henry Bailhache-Webb**. They finished third behind roaring Polish and German crews. Not gold, but the first men's eights medal since 1993, an amazingly good result in a tough event.



And the feisty LM4x lightweight men's quad, stroked by **Pete Chambers**, continued the promise shown at Henley Royal by pulling in a solid bronze of their own.

The other Brookes U23 talent this year were **Karl Hudspith** (bow of the M4+, miserably 9th overall after a disastrous week which saw their 4+ written off in the storm), and **Matt Tarrant** and **Scott Durant** (2 and stroke in a hopeful but overwhelmed M4-, 11th overall).

Taurus endurance rules land & water

hey may have hung up their rowing blades but some former Brookes athletes have far from lost their competitive spirits. Last Easter, when most of us were enjoying our chocolate eggs, four Taurus members embarked on the infamous Devizes to Westminster Race (DW). Two teams of two decided to take on the challenge, quite unaware of each other until only a few days before the event. It may not be rowing, but the quartet showed their attachment to being on the river as they prepared to kayak 126 miles non-stop at their own chosen pace.

Tamsin Adams and Kate Robinson took up kayaking at the beginning of the season because as Tamsin says: "we wanted to do something fun and not too serious!" It must have seemed as their plan backfired when they found themselves entering one of the hardest kayaking races in the world.

Not so much preparation for Adam Moffat and Tom Parker. The actual event was only the boys' fourth outing after they carried out their capsize drill in a heated swimming pool as Adam didn't want to get cold. The main aim of taking part in the DW though was to raise money for Harry Mahon Cancer Trust. They did so successfully - the boys would like to thank everyone for their contributions.

Back to the DW. Both teams put forward a fantastic effort as they paddled all day and all night, jumping in and out of their kayaks and carrying their boats over every lock in their path, grabbing small power snacks and hydration from their devoted support teams.

They arrived at the Tideway in the early morning of Easter Sunday and then prepared for the last surge all the way to Westminster. Despite really struggling with back pain and exhaustion in this last section the girls' team of Tamsin and Kate completed the race in just shy of 26 hours, two hours ahead of the boy's team who almost missed the docking

station beyond the finish line and were nearly swept off by the strong stream. Even after completing the challenge there was little time for celebration as the kayakers got into a well deserved marathon sleeping session.



It wasn't quite an over 24-hour haul, but in France, Ryan Davies and Danny Marett competed in the Paris marathon. It was, for both, their first marathon - Ryan decided to face his running gremlins and trained hard with his target to run within four hours, on the day he managed it with time to spare, 3h 57min! It was also Danny's first full marathon but he has a little more experience in running and completed the 26 miles in a very creditable 2h 58min. Well done to them both.

These are all fantastic achievements by former Brookes rowers and we can't help but feel proud as we congratulate them on their accomplishments. No doubt the hard training they went through at the Boat Club contributed to their successes.

Out and about — other Taurus action

First across the Indian Ocean

Ex-Brookes rower Andrew Delaney became a world record holder this summer when he and Guy Watts (*below*) won the Indian Rowing Race as Team MSS. They took 102 days to make the crossing, beating the other double in the race by just under a day. The row was in aid of male cancer charity Orchid, and they raised £76,500 for the trip.

As well as being the first and fastest duo to row unassisted from Western Australia to Mauritius, they became the first crew ever to row the Indian Ocean land to land.



"Those early mornings and long hours on the Thames at Wallingford being shouted at by the university rowing coach Richard Spratley seem like heaven now, compared with the endless rowing, food cravings and sores that I experienced in unmentionable places!", Delaney told the autumn issue of Brookes magazine *Observe* (below).





The autumn issue of *Observe* also included a full-spread feature on rowing at the university (*above*), a cover photo featuring current oarsman Mason Shoebridge, a tribute to Brookes BC benefactor Neil Ashley, and kindly pointed out that the club is "now one of the strongest in the world". 
